

My Whistle stop 8-day tour to Scotland, Ireland and Wales -

We had a guided tour of Belfast, seeing the Queen's University, Waterfront Hall and a visit to see the troubled areas in the past. Friday Prayers

In 1999 The Lord spoke, individually, to two women who were members of Adeyfield Free Church. He told both of them that He wanted a prayer time established each week where all members of the church could come together to listen to what was on His heart and to pray those things that He intended to bring into being with the obedience of the church. They went to John Hardaker, who was the minister then, and told him. They went, not knowing that the other had also gone.



John got the two women together and told them what had happened. They immediately decided to meet each week on Monday evenings for an hour from 7pm to do just what The Lord had said. They were joined by another woman and the three of them got to business with God.

They began with repentance and worship each week.

Not only was He faithful in telling them what was on His heart, He also showed them how to pray in different ways for different situations.

Once the pattern of attendance was established the women informed the rest of the church and invited all who were free to take the time out with God to pray and learn how to pray in wider ways. They were joined, at first by a couple of people and then by some elders who would be meeting for the monthly elders' meeting at 8pm. Then by others from the congregation. The group grew to around 15.

Most of the time they came with no agenda, being willing to receive God's focus.

God was faithful and began to give them instructions, encouragements and affirmations. They began to receive scriptures, pictures and individual words from the Lord and so as not to forget or miss anything, they wrote what they received on a flip chart so that they could refer back to that as they prayed.



Answers to their prayer times began to arrive. They saw that God would only give them new instructions and words once the last ones had been dealt with. He told them that they were to realise that those who prayed in this way were standing in the gap for the whole congregation and He would work in the congregation what He was telling them to pray. Some of the things they thought God might be saying seemed odd or puzzling so they tested them against scripture but because the messages



they received were coming to several of them at the same time they decided to persist and see what would happen. After all, there was nothing to lose if they were wrong, but what would be the benefits if they were right?

Occasionally issues arose in the church that needed specific prayer time so they would present those to God and ask for His help. Every so often they asked God if they should continue in the way they had been

doing and they tried to make any changes or adjustments they thought He might be saying. They took things slowly and carefully wanting only to do what God wanted of them. He was faithful and loving.

A sense of trust and acceptance grew among the group as they learned together. They prayed for more people to join them and invited individuals and the church as a whole to come but the numbers never grew past around 15. It was pointed out that, at that time, this represented around a tithe of the congregation number.

They continued to meet in the church every Monday evening apart from

Bank holidays and during August until we moved out of the old building. Then the meeting moved to the Manse. By now we had Pete Blackband as minister. Numbers fluctuated as the demographic of the congregation changed. But God never ceased to be faithful in speaking and acting on the prayers.

Then came lockdown. Once we had established how to use Zoom, Monday prayers were held on Zoom but the



change, the stress of the covid times, and the changes in the membership of the congregation meant that the habit was broken and the numbers of those who still met to pray were greatly reduced.

God still was faithful. Miraculously we still saw answers to prayer.

God still continued to speak and teach and encourage. But those who still met had their hearts broken when they realised how many of their fellow worshippers were missing out on the blessing that the time with God on Monday evenings brought to them.

Lockdowns lifted and the time came to rethink the prayer times. One or two of the original group got together to ask God if He still wanted the special prayer time to happen. **They came to the conclusion that He did.**

A question went out asking who would be prepared to meet in this way to pray and when was the best time. For those responding,

Friday lunchtimes were best

and so the prayer time was re-established every Friday from 1pm. We meet, usually around 6-8 people come and God remains to be faithful. It was decided to sometimes come with no agenda but, because we are having to deal with so many new challenges within the way we are setting up our church life on the Plaza, there would be subjects to present to God so that He can focus us on His heart for those specific things.

At the moment we are asking Him about the Children and Youth work.

He spent several weeks just focussing our attention on Him, His glory, His love, obedience to Him, His faithfulness and so on. But a couple of weeks ago there was a shift. It is so exciting when that happens because, over the years we have learned He is about to move when He does that.

Friday prayers will resume in September. The newsletter will tell you when. We wait with anticipation to see what God will do among our children and youth. We prayed for families and He brought them and now He has answered our prayers to that challenge in that a new Sunday group will be starting for 3-6-year-olds. A team of helpers will be forming so please answer that call if it comes to you.

If you are free on Fridays at 1pm don't miss out on the blessing. If you are not but you could meet with others at another time, get together and get going.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if we had groups all over the church meeting just to find out what is on God's heart then praying that into being?

Ministry And Mission Fund - Annual Letter To Local Churches

To: All members and adherents of United Reformed Churches and our Local Ecumenical Partnerships

Dear Friends,

When will normal service be resumed?


As we are writing this letter and closing off the URC's accounts for 2022, the country is still torn with industrial disputes, mostly notably with Health Service workers, rail industry workers, teachers etc. etc. Whatever your view as to the wisdom or justice of such action, we suspect all of us are affected by the disruption to some degree.

In church life too, are we back to "normal life"? Some churches no doubt have returned to something like their pre-Covid level of activity and attendance numbers. Quite a few have recommenced their activity but find their numbers have reduced. Some churches have found re-

opening too difficult and have decided to close.

Whatever the "new normal" was to be, we suggest its arrival has (like many trains) been disrupted, delayed, or cancelled all together.

The URC's finance officers had concerns that the late arrival of the return to normality would impact very significantly on the giving to the M&M Fund in 2022. However, the churches responded magnificently and the giving to M&M was £600,000 ahead of budget. It was also only 2.5% down on 2021's result.



So, thank you to all who continued to contribute to your local church, thank you to all those churches who met their commitment for 2022 in full, and thank you to all those who, in adversity, continued to treat the M&M Fund as the first priority and paid what they could. With normal service not yet resumed, 2023 is not going to be an easy year either. We now have the added disruption of high inflation, pushing up wages and overhead costs. As the Spirit directs and as our means allow, can the churches once more respond to the call of our gracious, loving and ever-generous God?

Again, thank you all!


